# JUBILANT MUSIC AND SONG AT 2024 JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION







The 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual St. James and Resurrection Juneteenth Celebration was held on June 22 at Leawood Resurrection. In partnership with St. James Church and Resurrection United Methodist Church, this year's theme was "Lift Every Voice and Sing...TOGETHER!"

An outstanding music program, created by Tyrone Yarbrough, St. James Director of Worship, and Isaac Cates, Resurrection Director of Music Outreach, left the audience breathless. Performers included powerful combined singers from both churches with renditions of "Trust In God" and "You Are Good".

The celebration continued with a host of Kansas City-based artists performing in music, song, dance and spoken word. Multi-instrumentalist and composer Charlie Harris, presented his guitar solo, "Suite for the Forgotten Black Heroes," against a visual background that highlighted Black inventors and leaders. Singer Devion Williams brought the audience to its feet with his solo rendition of "A Change Is Gonna Come." A stunning interpretive dance was performed by Lauren Thompson to "Love Supreme Pt. 1" by John Coltrane, and poet extraordinaire, Glen North, delivered his newest noteworthy creation, "Make Sure You Get It Right." Keynote speaker Dr. Shana Mashego, provided a historical and lyrical analysis of the 1900 communal anthem "Lift Every Voice and Sing," tracing its roots from the enslavement of Africans in 1444, through American colonization, the Civil War, Reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the early Civil Rights movement. The song's lyrics are by James Weldon Johnson and the music is by his brother, J. Rosamond Johnson. In 1917, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People began to promote the hymn as a Negro national anthem. Today it is featured in 42 different Christian hymnals and recorded and performed extensively. Fittingly, the Juneteenth program closed with Dr. Mashego leading the voices in singing the hymn to resounding applause.

### Our Hearts Were Strangely Lukewarm: The History of Anti-Black Racism in The Church



### IN MEMORIUM



With sorrow, we share the news of the passing of the Rev. Dr. James Lawson Jr. on June 9, 2024. He was a distinguished leader in the United Methodist Church and a revered civil rights activist.

Rev. Lawson's legacy began in 1959 when he led nonviolence workshops that led the successful campaign to desegregate lunch counters in Nashville, TN. Inspired by Christ's suffering, be empowered both Black and white students to organize sit-ins and other actions that confronted the immorality of segregation.

His influence extended widely as a key organizer of the Freedom Rides in 1961 and the Meredith March in 1966. While serving at Centenary Methodist Church in Memphis, he significantly contributed to the 1968 sanitation workers' strike; efforts that earned high praise from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who described Lawson as "the leading theorist and strategist of nonviolence in the world."

In 1974, Rev. Lawson moved to Los Angeles to serve as pastor of Holman Methodist Church. There, he hosted "Lawson Live," a weekly call-in show addressing social and human rights issues. He continued his activism by speaking out against racism, the Cold War, and U.S. military involvements. Even in retirement, Rev. Lawson championed the causes of justice, protesting with Janitors for Justice in Los Angeles and advocating for LGBTQ+ rights in Cleveland.

Rev. Dr. James Lawson Jr. will be remembered for his unwavering commitment to justice and equity. As he profoundly stated, "No human being in the sight of God is illegal."

### AVAILABLE NOW IN DIGITAL FORMAT



In 2022-23, the Johnson County Arts & Heritage Center presented an amazing special exhibition titled "Redlined: Cities, Suburbs, Segregation." The comprehensive exhibit took us on a journey through the origins, evolution and enduring consequences of redlining in Johnson County, our area communities, and nationwide.

Redlining refers to the systematic disinvestment of some people and neighborhoods in favor of others by the federal government and private lenders, most often on the basis of race. The exhibit details the 19th and 20th century foundations of redlining and how the private practice became federal policy during the Great Depression. It showed how the system expanded during postwar suburbanization, the failed attempts to dismantle it during the Civil Rights Era, and how the legacies of redlining continue to impact communities and individuals today.

The award-winning exhibit has now been preserved and transformed into a digital website format that allows expanded access to audiences everywhere. According to Dr. Mary Murry, Johnson County Museum Director, the digital platform is intended to preserve the true history and legacy of redlining while helping more people learn from the past in order to build a better future. The visionary Johnson County Museum Curator of Interpretation, Andrew R. Gustafson, expressed gratitude to the local community who demanded that the exhibit continue on, and gave generously to support the transformation of the physical exhibit into a digital one.

# The Heroic True-Life Adventures of Alvin Brooks



Academy Award-winning filmmaker Kevin Wilmott brings us this new documentary about the extraordinary life of Alvin Brooks who has dedicated over six decades to making Kansas City a better place. Born in 1932 in rural Arkansas, Alvin Brooks faced adversity from the start. His resilience led him to become one of Kansas City's first Black police officers in the 1950s and, later, the city's first Black department head. He founded the Ad Hoc Group Against Crime, becoming a national figure in civil rights and local activism. *The Heroic True-Life Adventures of Alvin Brooks* is a timely tribute to a man whose relentless fight for justice and equality continues to inspire Kansas Citians today. Folks in trouble with the law, the police themselves, politicians

# KC MEDIA COLLECTIVE IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE KANSAS CITY STAR



The 2024 KC Voter Guide is a first-of its kind collaboration that aims to harness the reporting power of multiple media organizations across the Kansas City metro. Support for the Guide comes from the Kauffman Foundation, the Health Forward Foundation and other donors. Together, we're working to provide crucial election coverage to our communities at a time when local newsrooms have diminished capacity to undertake such a project alone.

The 2024 Primary Elections in both states are on August 6, 2024. The <u>KC Voter Guide</u>, provides the information you need to vote in Jackson, Johnson, Clay, Platte and Wyandotte counties in 2024. In <u>Missouri</u> you must be registered by July 10. In <u>Kansas</u> you must be registered by July 16.

The deadlines to register for the November 5, 2024, General Election are October 9 in Missouri and October 15 in Kansas.

The KC Voter Guide will be publishing even more information in mid-July explaining every single candidate and race in the region — so sign up for reminders now!
