DID YOU KNOW?



See the young man in this picture? He was 18 when it was taken at the train station in Mobile, Alabama, in 1952. There is \$1.50 in his pocket. In that bag by his foot are two changes of clothes. (And if his mama was anything like most other mamas in the South, probably some sandwiches and other snacks.) He was on his way to Indiana to take a job. He was going to play baseball for the Indy Clowns of the Negro Leagues. Apparently, he was pretty good at it. A couple of years later, he was signed by the (then minor league) Milwaukee Brewers. He played for the Brewers for 2 seasons, then moved across town to the Braves, and later followed them to Atlanta. Eventually, he was the last Negro League player to be on a major league roster.

His name is "Hammerin' Hank" Aaron.

Hank Aaron is an amazing success story. From a childhood of poverty, he rose to become one of the greatest baseball players in history. Aaron broke record after record during his 23-year baseball career. On April 8, 1974, he belted his 715th homer to break Babe Ruth's all-time record, which he held for 33 years.

His playing career spanned the time between the Brown v. Board of Education decision (1954) and the US Bicentennial (1976), celebrating the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. Through it all, he endured the degrading Jim Crow South and faced racist slurs and death threats. Still, he retained a quiet strength and gentle, gracious demeanor. Aaron was a lifelong member of the NAACP. He used his platform to speak out against pervasive racism and injustice. He found in Jackie Robinson a friend and model to emulate. In his autobiography, *I Had a Hammer*, Aaron notes, "I can't let Jackie down, or my people, or myself. The day I become content is the day I cease to be anything more than a man who hit home runs."

After retiring from baseball, Aaron became executive vice president of the Atlanta Braves and a leading spokesman for minority hiring in baseball. He and his wife, Billye, co-founded the Chasing the Dream Foundation. The organization prioritizes helping disadvantaged young people develop their talents and pursue their dreams. The foundation provides scholarships, mentorship programs, and community initiatives.


- Learn about many of the highly significant contributions of formerly enslaved people
